1. Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Town Council of the Town of North Kingstown held on September 11, 2023 was called to order by President Mancini.

2. Notice of Meeting being posted

Pursuant to R.I.G.L. 42-46-6(c), notice of this meeting has been posted on the Secretary of State's Website.

3. Salute to Flag

President Mancini thanked the North Kingstown Fire Department and Police Department for conducting the 9/11 Ceremony honoring the victims and asked that we have a moment of silence in their honor after the pledge of allegiance.

President Mancini stated that since the last meeting we have had two prominent members of our community pass away, North Kingstown resident Neil Corkery and our Town Solicitor Matthew Callaghan. Neil was a former teacher, principal, legislator, and tireless advocate for those who struggled with addiction. In 1993, the General Assembly named a substance abuse facility after Neil. Many may know Neil from seeing him and his dog hanging out at Shayna's engaging in political discussions. President Mancini further stated that he has had the privilege of knowing Neil for 35 years and he was a tremendous human being.

President Mancini stated that although Matthew Callaghan was not a resident of North Kingstown, he contributed so much to our community. Matt devoted countless hours as Solicitor, providing this town and this Council with valuable legal and practical advice that has literally saved the taxpayers millions of dollars. Our community owes him a huge debt of gratitude and he will be a tremendous loss. What he most admired about Matt was how much he cared about our town, our town's workers, this council, and most of all his family.

Councilor Page stated that we will miss Matt in his way of interpreting something that was legalese into ordinary terms so that it was understandable. He had a great demeanor.

Councilor Anderson stated that Matt was the ultimate gentleman, served with distinction and dignity. Despite all of his experience and wisdom, he never made anyone feel less than and never appeared to be greater than. He was always humble, happy to have a conversation, and was empowering and supportive. She stated that his passing is an enormous loss to our community and offered condolences to his family and friends.

Councilor Mandel stated that he has only had the privilege of knowing Matt for a couple of years, and he was one of those people who was long on both smarts and common sense. We will miss him tremendously and the debt of gratitude this town owes him is tremendous. He will be hard to replace but we are very fortunate that Matt's son James will fill his spot at this table.

Mr. Mollis stated that he would echo the Council's comments that his passing is a tremendous loss, but he would also say that to all of us, Matt was much more than our Solicitor, he was a friend. Mr. Mollis further stated that he and Matt shared a lot of mutual interests and friends, and he made this job a lot of fun. He had a unique way of being calm yet assertive, be brilliant yet humble. He was a very unique individual. One thing that struck him after the tremendous service for Matt was one of our Police Officers said to him that the service and tribute to Matt was amazing and he hoped that he could be half the man that Matt was. Matt will be sorely missed.

James Callaghan thanked President Mancini, Council Members and Mr. Mollis, Jeannette, and Sue for their kind words and support. Matt had not been a Solicitor in any Town since 1987 and wasn't something he sought to do again. But, in 2017 we applied for this job, and maybe he pushed Matt into it a little bit, but when he accepted this position, he took it with both hands and loved it. That was because of the Council, Ralph, and the staff. He dedicated himself to this position every day and truly loved it. James further stated that he truly believes that it made Matt's last few years rewarding. He thanked the Council for the opportunity, and it was an honor for Matt.

President Mancini led those in attendance in a salute to the flag and in a moment of silence.

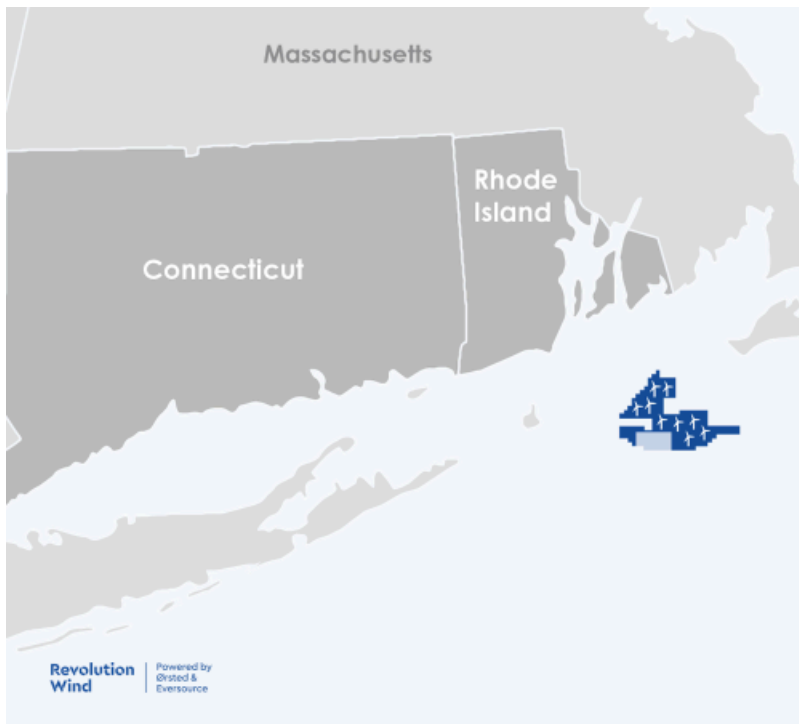

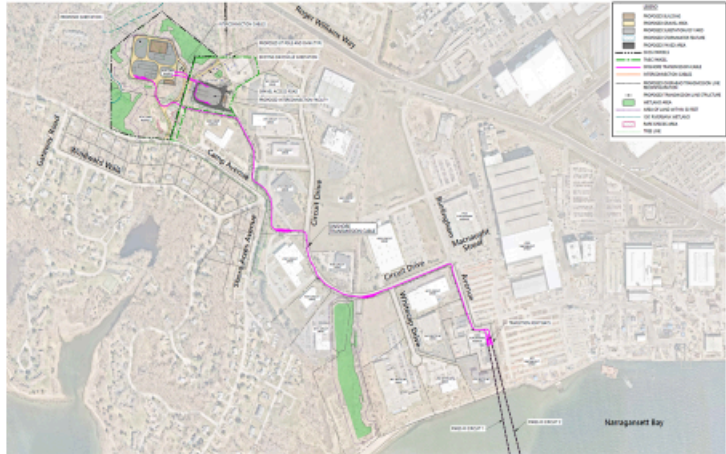

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President Mancini thanked Mr. Galvam and Mr. Buccheri for their presentation and commended them for their professionalism.

Councilor Mandel asked what the completion date is for the project. Mr. Galvam stated that it will be completed by the end of 2025.

Councilor Mandel asked what the benefits of the project are for the Town of North Kingstown. Mr. Galvam stated that this is a \$40 million infrastructure project with 1,200 construction jobs, among other things.

President Mancini asked if the land construction will affect any wetlands. Mr. Galvam stated no. Mr. Galvam further stated that all required state and federal permits are in place and any appeal periods have expired.

President Mancini suggested that Eversource and Burns & McDonnell hold a public information meeting at a site other than at QDC and offered the Town Hall Council Chambers. He further requested that he be included in their weekly e-mail updates.

Mr. Galvam thanked President Mancini for offering the Town Hall Council Chambers and agreed that it would be productive to hold a public meeting there.

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Curtis Fisher, 104 Phillips Street, stated that when the State Highway trucks are salting and sanding the roads, they are not putting down the baffles on the salt spreaders on the trucks and it is causing the salt to go over the roads and into the grass and is killing the grass and the trees and causing an environmental problem. He asked that the Town Council or representatives reach out to the state and ask that they put down the baffles to keep the salt and sand on the roads to protect the grass and trees along the roadways.

IV. REPORTS

23. Report by the Town Manager

Town Manager Mollis gave the following report:

- I want to begin by sharing with the town, and the Town Council, a call and letter I received from the Town Manager of Block Island thanking us for our mutual aid and the amazing efforts of our North Kingstown Fire Department and Chief during the tragic fire at the Harborside. As you know, we were transporting personnel and equipment via the Ferry and Coast Guard throughout the night and up to the conclusion of the fire. As Town Manager Crawford wrote, it was due to the “generosity of spirit, and the North Kingstown’s Fire Department’s courageousness that we were able to contain the fire, save the surrounding structures and ultimately, save downtown Block Island”. As I told the Town Manager, this was a true testament to proper planning and the intended spirit of what we know as mutual aid.
On a side note, I visited Block Island a few weekends after the fire and spoke with many businesses and residents who all emphasized how fortunate Block Island was to not have lost that entire block and how thankful they were to surrounding communities like North Kingstown.

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- With Labor Day already behind us, I want to report on behalf of our Recreation Director that the North Kingstown Recreation Department had a very successful and busy summer. Our Beach was open daily with large crowds, our Fireworks event was amazing, and the Arts Council Summer Concert Series was highly attended. We ran four affordable summer camp locations for ages 6 – 11, a two-week camp for ages 11 – 14, and an extended mini camp to end our season. We served approximately 370 children. Our North Kingstown Golf Course continued its record pace and outstanding playing conditions, and our Allen Harbor Marina continues to be in high demand as it was sold out again this year. We had a full summer of programming including Zumba, Yoga, Basketball, Tennis, Pickleball and much more. Our Fields Division did a great job in improving and maintaining our fields, bringing them to an even higher standard. Our Splashpad and renovated Playgrounds were all very busy. And we will start the process of hiring seasonal staff in January for next year’s Camp.
- I’ve had some follow-up conversations with Eve Clulow in regard to 55 Brown Street or what we know as the Annex. She has new information which she wants to share and will

be attending the public portion of your next, September 25th meeting. It may be helpful for us to have a brief Executive Session prior to this public meeting if appropriate. I will review, ask your thoughts, and advise prior to the meeting.

- We had a very successful, and well attended, Public Engagement Forum on the ongoing Wickford Parking Study on August 30th. I felt there were many eye-opening statistics and valuable information shared at this meeting. Pare Corporation will be reviewing the information provided, continuing their analysis and discussions with staff, and are planning to schedule a final public presentation to the Town Council over the next couple of months.
- Progress continues in our plans to become a “4 Minute City” with new portable Automatic External Defibrillators, or AEDs, now located within many of our parks and buildings, and more are being installed throughout this year.

In the event of a sudden cardiac arrest, users will need to dial 9-1-1 to obtain the lock box code and retrieve the handheld unit. On screen and audio instructions are clear and easy to follow. We will also be including Opioid Overdose Naloxone Kits in those units that have electricity, as a heating and cooling system is necessary to maintain these kits.

Research shows that when an AED or Naloxone is administered shortly after an incident, survival rates increase dramatically.

- R.I. Housing released their “Low- & Moderate-Income Housing Chart” a few weeks ago, incorporating the data from the 2020 Census. While I continue to take the position that North Kingstown is underrated as a result of the State not taking into consideration Mobile Homes when calculating this figure, our town’s 8.69% Low- & Moderate-Income Housing percentage is the 9th highest in all of Rhode Island.

As I’ve discussed with Governor McKee and Housing Secretary Pryor, and as the Governor has strongly agreed, Low & Moderate Income and associated deed restricted housing isn’t necessarily the issue in communities like North Kingstown. Our issue is the affordability of those families whose income may be greater than the threshold or may not be interested in deed restricted housing but can’t afford to buy or rent a home in town because of the high cost of housing and low inventory. Hopefully this will be a priority issue in 2024.

- The North Kingstown Fire Department and North Kingstown Police Department have announced that they will be hosting an Open House at the Public Safety Complex for members of the public to participate in a guided tour of the current complex. This tour is associated with pointing out the need for a new Complex and provide valuable insight prior to the November election where a new Public Safety Complex will be a question on the ballot. Pre-registration will not be required. Anyone interested just needs to show up at the time of the tour. We will be publicizing this on our Social Media Platforms and website. There will be three opportunities each on Thursday, September 21st and Thursday, October 19th at 5pm, 5:45pm, and 6:30pm. There will be three additional opportunities each on Saturday, September 23rd and Thursday, October 14th at 8am, 8:45am, and 9:30am. We will be promoting these on our Social Media Platforms and websites.

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- We had our first organizational meeting in preparation of our Town’s 350th Anniversary next year. We are all excited about our plans and I want to thank Council Persons Matt McCoy and Larry Mandel, as well as all those who participated, for their efforts in this important endeavor. We look forward to our upcoming meetings and hearing more about our plans to celebrate this historic anniversary.
- A brief update on the two new traffic signals on Boston Neck Road, one as we requested at the intersection at Hamilton Elementary School and the other at Route 138. The lights have been installed, prior to the opening of school as we requested, and DOT has advised us that they are working with the subcontractor to get them operational. We’ve asked them to inform us when they are going to complete the work and get them operational.
- At my request, and with the work of Adam White of Public Works, we will be replacing the tree in Updike Park that we use for the Christmas Tree Lighting. The tree is in tough

shape and despite our efforts we haven't been able to make it healthier. Adam is working with the Tree Warden, and it will be relocated. We will then find, cut, and place a tree for the holiday. This will be followed by our sourcing a new tree for this location to be planted in the spring. We are hoping to locate a healthy tree, in the 12' to 14' range. The Tree Warden is also working on a master tree plan for Veterans Memorial Park. There is significant clean up that needs to be completed including tree removal, trimming, and rebuilding of the garden beds and walkway. We are working with various board members so they are aware and can assist us.

- I want to thank the North Kingstown Fire Department and all those who attended and participated in this morning's annual 9-11 Remembrance Ceremony at our Town Beach. Thank you for your efforts in keeping this day and the historic courage and dramatic loss that took place that day fresh in all our minds.
- Finally, the RI Blood Center will be hosting a Blood Drive tomorrow at our Community Center from noon till 6pm. They encourage you to pre-register on their website at ribc.org. Walk-ins will be welcome if availability permits. The heat last week took a toll on blood donations at area drives and they are hoping for a successful Blood Drive here in North Kingstown.

The Council thanked Mr. Mollis for his thorough report.

Mr. Mollis stated that for informational purposes and potential discussion the following is an update on upcoming public forums, advertisements, and mailings relative to the two November Bond questions.

- There will be a Special Election on Tuesday, November 7th.
- There will be two questions on the ballot – A combined question with the Middle School and Public Safety Complex, and the second question will be for funding the Recreation Center.
- The questions are worded so that the projects are not site specific. However, the current proposal for the Middle School (grades 6 – 8) is at the Davisville Middle School site; the Public Safety Complex is adjacent to or at the current site, or at the Wickford Middle School site; and the Recreation Center is at the Davisville Academy site or within the Quonset Business Park. Again, they are not site specific, but what we will be promoting via renderings and information.
- The School Building Subcommittee is meeting this Thursday at 7:00 p.m. at the Hamilton Elementary School Library to continue discussions on the Bond as well as the Stage 2 submission to RIDE for the many improvements throughout the district.
- We have scheduled two informative public forums and brief presentations on all three projects, followed by ample time for questions from the public. These forums will complement the numerous presentations that have taken place with the Council, School Committee, and the Building Subcommittee. There has been a lot of information provided to the public over the last 6-12 months. The first forum will be on Tuesday, September 26th from 5:30 to 7:00 at the High School Auditorium; the second forum will be Thursday, October 12th from 5:30 to 7:00 at the Town Hall Council Chambers.

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- We are hosting guided tours at the current Public Safety Complex in September and October.
- We will also be putting together necessary informative advertisements which are required by law, as well as, preparing an informative postcard for mailing on the bond questions.
- There will be social media outreach, information on our webpage regarding the projects, renderings, and fiscal impacts of these projects.

Mr. Mollis stated that he is open to suggestions from the Council regarding getting information out to the voters. He further stated that Superintendent Duva is spearheading the Middle School information.

Councilor Anderson asked if these forums will be live streamed. Mr. Mollis stated yes.

President Mancini thanked Mr. Mollis for the update.
